Spoooner Park Riparian

This summer Cranbrook Society for Community Living began a summer-long project of pulling invasive plant species from the riparian zone in Spooner Park.



The first session was guided by Katie and Brett from the [East Kootenay Invasive Species Council](#) and resulted in filling ten bags with Burdock and Knapweed.

Mainstreams Water Science Program, began working in Spooner Park with Mt. Baker Geography and Outdoor Skills classes in 2010. Students have enhanced the riparian by planting, mulching, guarding and caring for twenty-four permaculture tree and shrub guilds.
